JSC-18-4442 916 INK <i>Sacramento County</i> \$40,000	With support from the California Arts Council, 916 Ink will provide 10 creative writing workshops to approximately 160 7th-12th grade students who are incarcerated or on probation to develop their unique voice, learn effective communication skills, creatively make decisions, and become excited about identifying as writers. Each student will receive a total of 18 hours of ELA instruction. Student poems, prose and stories will be professionally published in one of three anthologies.
JSS-18-4546 916 INK <i>Sacramento County</i> \$27,256	With support from the California Arts Council, 916 Ink will provide two creative writing workshops to up to 80 young men at the N.A. Chaderjian Youth Correctional Facility and O.H. Close Youth Correctional Facility. 916 Ink's workshops help participants learn effective communication skills, make creative decisions, and become excited about academic pursuits. Each participant will receive 18 hours of English-language arts instruction and have their writing published in a professional anthology.
JSC-18-4300 ACTORS GANG INC <i>Los Angeles County</i> \$45,000	With support from the California Arts Council, The Actors' Gang will be able to continue and deepen its work with children who are currently incarcerated and justice involved; to offer them the tools to make different choices, help heal trauma, find their voice and disrupt the pipeline to prison.

<p>JSC-18-4476 ARMORY CENTER FOR THE ARTS <i>Los Angeles County</i> \$40,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, the Armory Center for the Arts (Armory) will design and deliver vital arts opportunities for incarcerated teens at five LA County Probation Camps. The program builds upon Armory partnerships with LA County Probation and the Arts for Incarcerated Youth Network to eliminate recidivism, build resiliency, and cultivate pro-social behavior. Armory Teaching Artists will provide high quality arts instruction, mentoring, and collaborative art projects.</p>
<p>JSC-18-5241 ARTS COLLABORATIVE OF NEVADA COUNTY <i>Nevada County</i> \$23,814</p>	<p>With support from California Arts Council, NCArts will implement an interdisciplinary photography curriculum, meeting California VAPA and Common Core Standards at Charis Youth Center. Over 24 sessions, students will be guided through a 500-year relationship between scientific discovery and the art of photography, on a journey of self-reflection and individual creativity. In "Picture This," students will learn to use photography as a creative medium to further self-reflection, transformation and growth.</p>
<p>JSC-18-4309 ARTS COUNCIL OF MENDOCINO COUNTY <i>Mendocino County</i> \$21,600</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Arts Council of Mendocino County will fund an extended artist residency at Mendocino County Juvenile Hall resulting in three murals: one within the Juvenile Hall Courtyard which will be designed and painted by Juvenile Hall youth under the guidance of a lead artist, and two outside the Juvenile Hall which will mirror the murals within the hall and will be completed by youth on probation.</p>
<p>JSS-18-5384 ARTS FOR THE SCHOOLS <i>Nevada County</i> \$20,385</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Arts for the Schools will teach students standards-based, sequential visual arts and music curriculum twice a week at the Tahoe-Truckee Community School for youth on probation. Students will be positively impacted by increasing proficiency in visual and performing arts, learning tools for managing emotion and behavior, reinforce skill in math, science and social studies with arts integrated lessons, and participate in confidence building activities.</p>
<p>JSS-18-5463 COLLAGE DANCE THEATRE <i>Los Angeles County</i> \$50,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Heidi Duckler Dance (HDD) will conduct movement-based, creative health and wellness workshops with the youth at the Ventura Youth Correctional Facility (VYCF) – a state juvenile facility in the California State Division of Juvenile Justice – in Camarillo. The workshops will culminate in performances by the youth participants and HDD's company dancers for the VYCF youth and facility staff.</p>
<p>JSS-18-4398 COMBAT ARTS SAN DIEGO INC <i>San Diego County</i> \$20,088</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Combat Arts San Diego Inc will bring "Project Imagine 2" to the East Mesa Juvenile Detention Facility. The program consists of a seven-month mural program, an arts integration classroom guide for Juvenile Court and Community School (JCCS) teachers to utilize in their general education classes, cultural and workforce related field trips, and a visiting artist program.</p>
<p>JSC-18-4497 DESTINY ARTS CENTER <i>Alameda County</i> \$40,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Destiny Arts Center will partner with the Alameda County of Education to bring professionally taught spoken word classes to 80 justice-involved youth at Alameda Juvenile Justice Center's (AJJC) Butler Academic Center. DAC's creative youth development programs provide critical socio-emotional support to justice-involved youth. DAC will also convene AJJC staff and community partners to align arts and restorative justice efforts at juvenile hall.</p>

<p>JSC-18-4525 DIABLO BALLET <i>Contra Costa County</i> \$27,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Diablo Ballet will lead its yearlong PEEK Extension program at John A. Davis Juvenile Hall in Martinez, CA. PEEK Extension is a creative movement program that encourages students to utilize dance as a way to enhance mental, emotional and physical well-being. Students work through the PEEK Extension program once a week over a ten-month period, which provides students' skills to reintegrate back to school successfully.</p>
<p>JSS-18-5509 EACH ONE REACH ONE <i>San Mateo County</i> \$45,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Each One Reach One (EORO) will conduct six cycles of our national-award winning Playwriting Program. Since 1998, our arts programming has exposed youth engaged with the juvenile justice system to the expressive and healing power of playwriting while giving voice to a population too often voiceless.</p>
<p>JSC-18-5269 INK PEOPLE INC <i>Humboldt County</i> \$45,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Ink People will facilitate four artists in Humboldt County's Juvenile Hall, Regional Center, Court Appointed Community Schools, and two more artists at the Ink People's MARZ Project. They will engage the youth in poetry and creative writing, Native American cultural values and arts, guitar lessons, digital music creation and composition, and mural design and painting in focused contact blocks over the course of a year.</p>
<p>JSC-18-5397 INNER-CITY ARTS <i>Los Angeles County</i> \$40,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Inner-City Arts will provide 20 hours of sequential arts instruction to 50 youth from Homeboy Industries. In addition, youth will attend Richard Cabral's performance of Fighting Shadows, which tells his story of transformation out of violence, gangs, and incarceration to art, family, and love. The themes of the show will serve as central themes of the six-week curriculum. By the end, students will perform their work at ICA's Rosenthal Theater.</p>
<p>JSC-18-5141 MARIN SHAKESPEARE COMPANY <i>Marin County</i> \$25,700</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Marin Shakespeare Company will provide a drama-therapy and art-therapy inspired program for students at Marin's Community School for three months in the Fall of 2019 or Spring of 2020, and provide opportunities for students to attend a professional Shakespeare performance, and participate in Classroom Visits/Workshops with professional actors, some of whom will be formerly incarcerated theatre artists.</p>
<p>JSC-18-5386 MARIPOSA COUNTY ARTS COUNCIL INC <i>Mariposa County</i> \$41,500</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, the Mariposa County Arts Council and partner, Sierra Quest Human Services Foundation, will continue our visual arts program serving probation youth. This program supports research indicating that exposing youth to art promotes emotional intelligence and critical thinking skills. This program focuses on visual literacy and visual projects through artist-residencies, facilitated art talks, and field trips to major Bay Area museums.</p>
<p>JSC-18-4266 MEDIA ARTS CENTER SAN DIEGO <i>San Diego County</i> \$45,000</p>	<p>With support from the CAC, Media Arts Center San Diego will conduct Emerging Makers, an arts outreach program providing media arts education for youth transitioning from juvenile justice systems with weekly filmmaker-led workshops. In partnership with San Diego Second Chance and with the addition of several Juvenile Court Community School sites, new for this project year of 19-20, students will produce films exploring topics about the criminal justice system and restorative justice practices.</p>

<p>JSC-18-5084 MEDIA4GOOD INC <i>Santa Barbara County</i> \$39,015</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Media4Good dba Youth Interactive will impact 40-60 youth at the Los Prietos Boys Camp with our Resurrected by Youth (RBY) program. RBY is a revolutionary entrepreneurship and arts-based vocational program transforming the lives of youth with criminal histories. On release, youth reenter society with a cash paycheck, mentors and access to wrap around services. In 2019-20, we plan to increase our post release mentor support services in Santa Barbara County.</p>
<p>JSC-18-5062 MID-CITY COMMUNITY MUSIC <i>San Diego County</i> \$49,970</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Mid-City Community Music will provide daily arts workshops at 37ECB Juvenile Court and Community School in San Diego for the 2019-2020 school year. California teaching artists will conduct workshops in a variety of disciplines including music, visual arts, poetry, drama, and dance. Funds will be used to provide qualified teaching artists and art supplies, to collect and assess program data, and to host quarterly performance events for the community.</p>
<p>JSC-18-4507 MUSICIANS FOR EDUCATION INC <i>San Diego County</i> \$24,000</p>	<p>With support from the CAC, Musicians for Education will provide an arts education-college bridge program for 100 abandoned and abused teen mothers who attend Lindsay Community School – part of San Diego’s Juvenile Court and Community School system. Our program provides the standards-based arts education credits these students need to receive their high school diploma and enroll in college. One hundred percent of our students complete our program.</p>
<p>JSC-18-4789 NIMBUS ARTS <i>Napa County</i> \$44,807</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Nimbus Arts will expand its innovative education program for the Napa County Juvenile CCS. In four years our program has grown from serving 20 students to engaging and educating over 100 young people. We will expand our program, delivering more studio time and artist mentoring---increasing transformational benefits to the students. Continued artist education capsules and a student public art component will elevate outcomes and inspire our students more fully.</p>
<p>JSC-18-5162 OAKLAND PARKS AND RECREATION FOUNDATION <i>Alameda County</i> \$31,128</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Today’s Future Sound, a fiscal sponsor of Oakland Parks and Recreation Foundation, will deliver interdisciplinary, culturally sustaining, and therapeutic arts education to system-engaged youth in Alameda County Juvenile Hall.</p>
<p>JSC-18-4761 OLD GLOBE THEATRE <i>San Diego County</i> \$2,500</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, The Old Globe will work with Amanda Wallace, Visual and Performing Arts Technician for the San Diego County Office of Education's Juvenile Court and Community Schools (JCCS), to adapt Reflecting Shakespeare—our successful program currently used in adult correctional facilities—to better meet the needs of system-engaged youth. Through the planning grant, the Globe will test an adapted version of the program in up to three JCCS facilities.</p>
<p>JSC-18-5132 OUTSIDE THE LENS <i>San Diego County</i> \$50,000</p>	<p>Outside the Lens is partnering with San Pasqual Academy for a second year of programming to bring digital media arts to the students of the Academy--youth who are dependents of the Juvenile Court of San Diego County. With the support from the California Arts Council, this program will continue to allow youth to understand and tell their stories through photography, and will expand to offer internship, work-readiness education and skill-building opportunities.</p>

<p>JSC-18-5007 PERFORMING ARTS CENTER OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY <i>Los Angeles County</i> \$20,126</p>	<p>With the support of the California Arts Council, The Music Center will partner with Arts for Incarcerated Youth Network and LA County Arts Commission to introduce students at LA County incarcerated youth facilities to different cultures through various artistic traditions. Program features include dance, music and theatre, and workshops aligned to cultural traditions and themes. Funds will be used to compensate the artists, and for materials and administrative support from The Music Center.</p>
<p>JSC-18-4528 PERFORMING ARTS WORKSHOP INC <i>San Francisco County</i> \$8,621</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Performing Arts Workshop will conduct a 45-week creative writing residency in partnership with Marin County Juvenile Hall / Office of Education. Our trained teaching artist will conduct weekly 90-minute classes; the residency will culminate in the publication of a written anthology. Young poets will have the opportunity to record readings of their poems to be played on stage at our 2020 annual Student Showcase.</p>
<p>JSC-18-4473 PLAYWRIGHTS PROJECT <i>San Diego County</i> \$40,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, PWP will engage justice involved youth in Defining Moments playwriting and theater education. The program empowers students to exercise their artistry, value their personal achievements and develop greater empathy. It improves the perception of peers, adults, and the general public by demystifying commonly held myths about at-risk youth and celebrating their ability to succeed. The grant will pay for artists' fees and program costs.</p>
<p>JSC-18-5375 PONY BOX DANCE THEATRE <i>Los Angeles County</i> \$45,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Pony Box Dance Theatre and Center for Empowerment of Families will provide 65 trauma exposed youth to therapeutic dance and mentorship, to learn healthy coping skills, in a program called "The Dance for Healing Project." The program includes counseling from a licensed therapist, journal writing and sharing healthy snacks after each class and culminates in a performance at the facility for peers, staff and family members.</p>
<p>JSC-18-4508 PUTNAM FOUNDATION <i>San Diego County</i> \$22,500</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Putnam Foundation will provide weekly Creative Choices art classes to serve and empower more than 600 of San Diego's incarcerated youth, grades 9 to 12. Juvenile wards of the San Diego County court will earn high school credits while learning to express thoughts, ideas, and feelings through the healthy and creative outlet of art. Finished artwork will be celebrated through social media, and on video display in the Timken Museum and Juvenile Hall.</p>
<p>JSC-18-5308 REDWOOD CITY PARKS AND ARTS FOUNDATION <i>San Mateo County</i> \$39,392</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Redwood City Parks and Arts Foundation will offer a program of hands-on arts training in a series of workshops to achieve several objectives, including: to enhance the suite of rehabilitative options for youth in the Redwood City Juvenile Diversion Program; to pilot a program for future expansion throughout San Mateo County; to cultivate positive ties between at-risk youth, members of law enforcement, and the community where they live.</p>

<p>JSC-18-4691 RHYTHM ARTS ALLIANCE <i>Los Angeles County</i> \$50,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Rhythm Arts Alliance will facilitate 16 12-week drum, dance and song workshops for at-risk youth including, but not limited to the following Juvenile Detention facilities: Camp Joseph Scott, Camp Kilpatrick and Dorothy Kirby Center. Workshops will take place twice a week, for 1 ½ hours per class. Each 12-week cycle will culminate by the youth blending dance, drumming and song into a performance shared with family, friends and probation staff.</p>
<p>JSC-18-5344 RYSE INC <i>Contra Costa County</i> \$45,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, RYSE Inc will launch four cohorts of a Hip Hop Heals + Digital Storytelling curriculum to support the personal growth, expression, and healing of 40 young men ages 13-17 committed by Juvenile Court and staying at the Orion Allen Youth Rehabilitation Facility. Participatory workshops will be led and facilitated by RYSE staff and arts contractors who specialize in hip-hop history, media arts production, healing facilitation, poetry, and spoken word.</p>
<p>JSC-18-5233 SAN BENITO COUNTY ARTS COUNCIL <i>San Benito County</i> \$34,650</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, the San Benito County Arts Council will partner with the San Benito County Juvenile Hall and San County Office of Education to engage incarcerated and at-risk youth in multidisciplinary artist-in-residency programs at three sites. The Dreams Project fosters creative expression and arts accessibility through standards-aligned arts curriculum, providing at-risk youth new tools to learn, heal and express themselves while working towards graduation.</p>
<p>JSS-18-5041 SAN DIEGO CULTURAL ARTS ALLIANCE <i>San Diego County</i> \$26,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, the San Diego Cultural Arts Alliance will implement two sessions of The Diversionary Graffiti Education & Mural Arts Programs to a variety of youth at risk. The program partnership with the District Attorney’s office, San Diego County Sheriff, San Diego Police Department and the San Diego County Probation Department is designed to provide early intervention to deter juvenile offenders from further involvement in the justice system.</p>
<p>JSC-18-4764 SAN DIEGO MUSEUM OF ART <i>San Diego County</i> \$31,128</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, the San Diego Museum of Art will offer hands-on arts experiences to young people who are incarcerated, on probation, or considered at risk of incarceration in partnership with the local juvenile detention center, court and community schools in order to foster positive social, behavioral and academic changes. Experience has shown that creating art is a great stimulus for positive change – SDMA’s programs seek to help at-risk youth break a cycle of risky behaviors, and make changes that lead to more purposeful and joyful lives.</p>
<p>JSC-18-5187 SLOW THEATRE <i>Butte County</i> \$12,200</p>	<p>With the support of the California Arts Council, Slow Theatre will provide theatre arts education at two Butte County Office of Education schools that serve youth who are incarcerated, on probation, or have demonstrated at-risk behaviors. Building on our previous work with students in juvenile hall, this project will incorporate curriculum and activities that will help students create theatre works based on their personal experiences and issues related to their environments.</p>

<p>JSC-18-4245 SOUTHLAND SINGS <i>Los Angeles County</i> \$39,960</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Southland Sings will partner with Orange County Alternative, Community and Correctional Education Schools and Services (ACCESS) to deliver My Story, My Voice: Poetry to Song to incarcerated students at juvenile detention centers and juvenile re-entry sites. My Story, My Voice: Poetry to Song is a 20-session sequential residency program integrating music composition and performance, spoken word, literacy and theater.</p>
<p>JSC-18-4700 SPECTORDANCE <i>Monterey County</i> \$45,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, SpectorDance (SD) and Rancho Cielo (RC) will continue to offer dance classes, choreography workshops, and culminating public performances. These classes and performances will generate a deeper understanding of the power of self-expression, as well as empathy among audiences about the complexity of gang-related issues. This project will explore dance as a tool for prevention, a catalyst for conversation and a pathway for building community.</p>
<p>JSS-18-5380 SPECTORDANCE <i>Monterey County</i> \$50,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, SpectorDance (SD) and Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) will offer dance classes, choreography workshops, and culminating public performances in order to generate a deeper understanding of the power of self-expression through dance, as well as empathy among audiences about the complexity of gang-related issues. This project will explore dance as a tool for prevention, a catalyst for conversation, and a pathway for building community.</p>
<p>JSC-18-4869 STREET POETS INC <i>Los Angeles County</i> \$29,200</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Street Poets Inc will facilitate two 12-week Poetry/Hip-Hop and Gardening workshops at Central High School in the Mar Vista Gardens. Each workshop will begin with a Street Poets kickoff performance and workshops will culminate with a class performance for youth to share their work with the school and community. Youth will also learn to plant, grow and harvest a garden, working in the soil and feeding their soul.</p>
<p>JSC-18-5394 THE AJA PROJECT <i>San Diego County</i> \$39,999</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, The Aja Project will implement PhotoCity; teaching underserved youth in Juvenile Court and Community Schools to “turn the lens outward” and critically examine issues that affect their lives and communities through the arts. Students learn photography techniques to explore critical social issues impacting their lives and communities, culminating in a student art exhibit to present images, speak out, and take ownership of the issues identified.</p>
<p>JSC-18-5310 THE DAVID S HARP FOUNDATION INC <i>San Diego County</i> \$48,470</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, The David's Harp Foundation, Inc. will empower their Artist Mentors (Hip-Hop artist/producers/instructors) to inspire, educate and empower youth incarcerated in East Mesa Juvenile Detention Facility and, as a result will afford them: (1) a creative space to process stressful life situations through song, (2) transferable skills in music production/audio engineering, (3) access to consistent mentorship, and (4) behavioral accountability.</p>
<p>JSC-18-5090 THE H E ART PROJECT <i>Los Angeles County</i> \$45,000</p>	<p>With the support of the California Arts Council, artworxLA's professional teaching artists will deliver a sequential series of three 11-week artmaking workshops in 10 juvenile justice and community school facilities in 2019-20, as part of artworxLA's in-school programming. Programming is designed in collaboration with select cultural institutions and original student work presented therein (2018-19: Autry Museum, Natural History Museum of L.A. County, and USC School of Architecture).</p>

<p>JSC-18-5424 THEATRE & ARTS FOUNDATION OF SAN DIEGO COUNTY <i>San Diego County</i> \$15,210</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Theatre & Arts Foundation of San Diego County will provide incarcerated students with an introductory survey course in the vocational skills necessary to become professional theater technicians or special events crew.</p>
<p>JSC-18-4466 UNUSUAL SUSPECTS THEATRE CO <i>Los Angeles County</i> \$43,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, The Unusual Suspects Theatre Company (US) will provide up to 40 high-needs incarcerated minors at the Dorothy Kirby Center with our standards-based Youth Theatre Residency Program (YTRP). Via a 10-week playwriting workshop and a 10-week performance workshop, youth will gain skills to create/perform an original play as an ensemble. Each workshop culminates in a public staged performance. Funds will support artists and staff who implement the residency.</p>
<p>JSC-18-4438 VENTURA COUNTY ARTS COUNCIL <i>Ventura County</i> \$40,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Ventura County Arts Council will continue to provide arts programming in the county juvenile facility in Oxnard. We will also continue arts activities at sites working with system-engaged youth: an Evening Reporting Center (ERC) in Fillmore, a safe house for sexually trafficked girls in Ojai. We will expand this work to include a continuation school in Ventura, a new ERC in Simi, and a facility for foster youth in Camarillo.</p>
<p>JSS-18-4439 VENTURA COUNTY ARTS COUNCIL <i>Ventura County</i> \$50,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, the Ventura County Arts Council will provide arts programming to the Ventura Youth Correctional Facility in the areas of music, poetry writing and visual art. Teaching artists will work inside the facility on an on-going basis, offering year-round arts instruction to incarcerated youth.</p>
<p>JSC-18-4209 WILLIAM JAMES ASSOCIATION <i>Santa Cruz County</i> \$28,080</p>	<p>With support from the CAC, William James Association will deliver engaging, inspiring, in-depth and on-going visual arts classes led by professional artists at Marin County Juvenile Hall and Marin Oaks High through our TeamWorks Art Mentoring Program. With off-campus art mentoring workshops at accessible neighborhood venues, justice system involved youth can maintain collaboration with their artist mentors, fulfilling a purpose in their community by co-creating culturally relevant public murals.</p>
<p>JSC-18-5443 WOMEN WONDER WRITERS <i>Riverside County</i> \$27,664</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Women Wonder Writers will support the Jurupa Unified School District (JUSD) Student Court with its proven literary and cultural arts programs. Together we are committed to ensure that art is accessible to our young and vulnerable Inland Empire students, specifically those who are at risk of being engaged in the juvenile justice system.</p>
<p>JSC-18-4520 YOLO COUNTY ARTS COUNCIL INC <i>Yolo County</i> \$45,000</p>	<p>With support from the California Arts Council, Yolo County Arts Council Inc will deliver arts education to 220 students incarcerated at Yolo County Juvenile Hall or attending Cesar Chavez Community School, a community school for students on probation, working closely with Yolo County Probation and Yolo County Office of Education learning in 2-D visual arts, graphic design, film making, ceramics, creative writing/spoken word and Danza (Aztec dance) for students in the juvenile justice system.</p>
